**1. CALL TO ORDER**

Meeting was called to order by Kristin Sheffield at 11:30 AM.

**2. ROLL CALL**

Kristin Sheffield called for a motion to allow those on zoom due to illness or family emergency to participate in the meeting. Lynn LaPlante made a motion to allow those on zoom to participate in the meeting, Paula Garcia seconded the motion, and all voted ayes. The motion was carried.

**3. PUBLIC COMMENTS AND CONCERNS**

No public comment received at this meeting.

**4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

Kristin Sheffield called for a motion to approve the July 16, 2024, meeting minutes Lynn LaPlante made a motion to approve the minutes, Paula Garcia seconded the motion, and all voted ayes. The motion carried.

**5. REPORTS – GINA STRAFFORD-AHMED**

Gina Strafford-Ahmed reviewed the 2024 3rd quarter CSBG Summary Report which detailed each program's progress and accomplishments for this grant year. She explained that there is a concern with 360 Youth Services, they have not submitted any new clients or re-certifications in over 90 days. We have addressed our concerns with them and reminded them of the milestones in their contract. Gina reviewed the Scholarship program, we had 13 individuals apply, eight submitted complete applications and five that did not complete the application process. Home DuPage is struggling with the financial fitness class enrollment due to low referrals. They are currently seeking new partners, Gina asked if anyone is interested to please reach out. She stated that she has also been in contact with Home DuPage regarding credit counselling and is awaiting a response back from them.

The Agency Capacity Building Activities she explained consisted of the needs assessment, ROMA and training opportunities we provide to staff which will be completed at the end of the year. Handouts provided.

## 6. BUDGET REVIEW – GINA STRAFFORD

Gina Strafford-Ahmed reviewed the CSBG 2024 Budget and Expenditure Report. She explained that most agencies have submitted their quarterly billing and are on track to spend their funds by the end of the year. The only agency that we have not received billing from is 360 Youth Services. Handouts provided.

## 7. OLD BUSINESS

2024 Needs Assessment: Gina Strafford-Ahmed advised the Board the 2024 CSBG Needs Assessment Update is completed. She explained that there was a better turn out than expected with the short time frame. We will have a new survey system in place for our next assessment and it should improve our ability to reach more respondents. Kristen Sheffield asked if there were any questions or corrections. The Board had no questions or concerns; Kristen Sheffield called for a motion to approve the 2024 CSBG Needs Assessment. Lynn LaPlante made a motion to approve the 2024 CSBG Needs Assessment, Paula Garica seconded the motion, all voted ayes. The motion was carried. Mary Keating asked if there were any major findings in the survey and Gina explained that the only one was the credit counseling. We will be looking into adding that as a service in 2025 via Home DuPage or another organization.

## 8. NEW BUSINESS-GINA STRAFFORD-AHMED

CSBG Scholarship: Gina Strafford-Ahmed gave a presentation highlighting 2024 CSBG Scholarship winners. This year \$25,000 was awarded, handouts provided.

Bianca Rodriguez will be attending Elmhurst University, was awarded \$7,000 and is majoring in Psychology & Sociology. Bianca is a first-generation student and plans to use the Scholarship to help cover the cost of tuition.

Kary Hernandez is a previous recipient and will be attending Loyola University, was awarded \$5,000 and is majoring in Social Work. Kary is a first-generation student and is a member of the Zapotec indigenous community. Kary plans to use the Scholarship to help cover the cost of tuition.

Cynthia Figueroa will be attending Lewis University, was awarded \$3,500 and is majoring in Radiography. Cynthia is a first-generation student and plans to use the Scholarship to help cover the cost of tuition.

Malika Freeman is a previous recipient and will be attending College of DuPage, was awarded \$3,500 and is majoring in Surgical Technology. Malika is a returning student, FSS participant and plans to use the Scholarship to help cover the cost of tuition.

De'Lisa Trigg is a returning student and will be attending College of DuPage was awarded \$2,000 and is majoring in Respiratory Therapy. De'Lisa plans to use the Scholarship to help cover the cost

of tuition.

Nania Chol is a previous recipient and will be attending Columbia College of Chicago, was awarded \$2,000 and is majoring in Film and Television. Nania is a refugee and first-generation student and plans to use the Scholarship to help cover the cost of tuition.

Ali Khak will be attending College of DuPage, was awarded \$1,000 and is majoring in STEM. Ali's plans to use the Scholarship to help cover the cost of tuition.

Sonya Thomas will be attending Waubensee Community College, was awarded \$1,000 and is majoring in Business Administration. Sonya is a previous DuPage Pads participant and plans to use the Scholarship to help cover the cost of tuition..

Gina reminded the board how the Scholarship could be used: books, transportation, tuition, laptops, room/board, fees, and supplies. She explained we are working on an online application process and hope to have it ready for the 2025 process.

#### **9. 211**

Gina Trafford-Ahmed reviewed in detail the 211 DuPage 2024 third Quarter Summary Report. She explained that housing was still the number one need and that the calls/texts are steadily increasing. Gina reminded the Board they can see the main report on the dashboard which can be sorted monthly, yearly and by certain dates. She also explained that this information is available by visiting: [211dupage.gov](http://211dupage.gov), click on about us and then navigate to 211 counts. The Board requested if the second and third column on the second page can be cancelled and would like to see if there is any way to do a comparison from last quarter verses current quarters or just list the numbers the description is not necessary. Gina stated that she will check into it. Handout provided.

The Board would like to see if possibly getting someone from Home DuPage to do a presentation.

**Subject:** Third Quarterly Report for the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) – Produce for Pantries (PFP) Program

We are pleased to submit the third of four quarterly reports detailing the use of the Community Services Block Grant awarded by DuPage County for The GardenWorks Project's *Produce for Pantries Program*. This report covers activities and achievements from July 2024 to September 2024.

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## Mission Overview

*The mission of The GardenWorks Project is to promote organic suburban agriculture to improve the well-being of our community, the environment, and those facing food insecurity. We empower, educate, and support all food growers in their efforts to nourish their families and neighbors in need.*

## Program Goals

The Produce for Pantries (PFP) Program aims to:

- Enhance food resilience in DuPage County by establishing community gardens.
- Serve as food production and educational hubs.
- Improve food access and equity by facilitating connections between food growers and emergency food assistance agencies.
- Grow produce specifically for donation, ensuring fresh and timely provision to those in need.
- The CSBG directly supports five garden sites in DuPage County. GardenWorks overall program involves 182 garden beds across 26 locations.

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## Third Quarter Progress (July 2024 – September 2024)

**Educational Outreach:** This programming, supported by the CSBG grant, reaches all food growers interested in growing to donate to local food pantries. The use of the free mobile app, *Fresh Food Connect*, is featured at all events to encourage food growers to record their donations. Each of the following events demonstrate a partnership with GardenWorks and other county organizations.

- **Edible Gardening Workshop:**  
*Date:* July 9, Wheaton Public Library (42 attendees)
- **DuPage County Fair:**  
*Date:* July 25-28, DuPage Fairgrounds (Garden tours and educational outreach)
- **Fall Gardening Workshop:**  
*Date:* August 8, Morton Arboretum (32 attendees)
- **Volunteer Lead Check-In:**  
*Date:* September 19, GardenWorks Resource Center (18 attendees)
- **Hunger Action Month Food Drive:**  
*Date:* September 26, GardenWorks Resource Center  
Produce deliveries to People's Resource Center and Hamdard Health Food Pantries.

### **Garden Site Outreach**

- Colony Park Community Garden: July 22 (15 residents, staff, volunteers)
- Timber Lake Mobile Food Pantry: July 25, August 22 (150+ attendees)
- Outreach for 2025: Glendale Heights, Bensenville Public Library

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### **Garden Site Updates**

#### **Timber Lake Apartment Homes (West Chicago)**

- Initially intended as a household community garden, a resident took over as garden lead, harvesting and delivering produce to the community room at the apartment complex ("The Hub") for residents. Residents were also encouraged to harvest as needed.
- Produce included herbs, tomatoes, cucumbers, and zucchini, with further harvest support provided from the GardenWorks community garden during Northern Illinois Food Bank mobile distributions. Recipes accompanied freshly made salads and salsa.

#### **New Hope United Methodist Church (West Chicago)**

- During July – September, the 12 garden beds produced 35 pounds of produce per month for Lehman Middle School and Wayne Township Food Pantries.
- Produce included eggplant, chilis, basil, tomatillos, tomatoes, and green peppers.
- Discussions about bed replacement and adjusting crops to better serve pantry needs are underway.

#### **Colony Park Community Garden (Carol Stream)**

- A household community garden with 12 tabletop beds for senior residents.
- Feedback was collected during a July 22 outreach event, with residents suggesting changes for next year. This included more options for planting and an early planting date.

### **Project Rise, Burhani Park (Willowbrook)**

- A market community garden managed by the Dawoodi Bohra community, producing 16 pounds in July, 30.25 pounds in August, and 27 pounds in September for the Ann M. Jeans Food Pantry.
- Produce included tomatillos, okra, cucumbers, lemongrass, and herbs.
- The Project Rise Dawoodi Bohra community oversees this project and the delivery of produce to the pantry.

### **Green Trails Community Garden (Lisle)**

- Six beds produced 64 pounds of produce, including cilantro, mustard greens, peppers, beets, and radishes.
- Discussions are underway to determine if this site will remain in the 2025 garden plan.

### **DuPage County Fairgrounds Demonstration Garden**

- Expanded in spring 2024, with two weekly produce deliveries.
- A second expansion is now expected in spring of 2025, with surveys conducted to determine best plants to address clients needs.

- Ongoing promotion of the Fresh Food Connect app.
  - Share progress on social media, newsletters, and printed materials.
3. **Events**
- Host year-end educational workshops for all food growers.
  - Host year-end review with garden lead volunteers.

## Impact and Outcomes

The Produce for Pantries Program continues to thrive, providing much-needed fresh produce to food-insecure individuals across DuPage County. Using the *Fresh Food Connect App* continues to demonstrate the volume of produce being delivered to local food pantries. We are grateful for the support of DuPage County, our partners, and volunteers.




