<p style="text-align: right;">Page 6</p> <p>1 motion, signify by saying aye. 2 (Whereupon, all 3 Commissioners responded 4 aye.) 5 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Any opposed? 6 (No response.) 7 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: The motion carries 8 and the matter will be continued to 6:00 on 9 December 19th in Room 3500-B. 10 Now, I'll go to our next 11 case which is 24-075, the Moksh Dham Cremation. 12 This is a request for a conditional use for a 13 funeral home with cremation services in the R-4 14 Single-Family District. The matter was 15 published in the Daily Herald on Thursday, 16 December 12th. 17 The petition has been 18 circulated to the various departments of the 19 County and neighboring municipalities and other 20 authorities. I have objections filed by the 21 Health Department, I have objections filed by 22 the Village of Bensenville, District 2 School 23 District, and School District 100. 24 We're going to -- our rules</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 8</p> <p>1 MR. WHITE: They're here to answer 2 questions. I was going to do a proffer of 3 testimony, confirm with the witnesses. 4 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Yeah, that's 5 perfect. In fact, we often invite that. 6 So, exhibits? 7 MR. WHITE: I do have five exhibits. 8 Exhibit 1 is the survey; Exhibit 2 is the site 9 plan; Exhibit 3 is the Owner's Consent, the one 10 I originally submitted was a copy of the 11 contract. I had a contract, but I got my 12 signed copy now from the owner's. Exhibit 4 is 13 a Cremation Environmental Analysis by Cremation 14 Systems, and Exhibit 5 is an Amended Brief in 15 support of the application for conditional use. 16 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Okay, we'll accept 17 all of those exhibits. 18 (Whereupon, Petitioner's 19 Exhibits 1 through 5 were 20 marked and received into the 21 record.) 22 MR. WHITE: I also have other boards I 23 may or may not use, depending on the questions. 24 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Okay.</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 7</p> <p>1 are that we will go until as long as 8:00 this 2 evening. We're going to take the petitioner's 3 statement first, then we'll have perhaps some 4 questions from the members of the Zoning Board, 5 and then we'll go to public comment. We don't 6 make a decision tonight. If we do conclude the 7 hearing, we won't make a decision tonight but 8 we'll defer the matter for consideration to our 9 recommendation meeting. 10 So, with that, may I ask 11 Mr. White to stand. The first matter of 12 business is for you and all your witnesses to 13 be sworn in, sir. So could I ask the Court 14 Reporter to swear in you and your witnesses. 15 THE COURT REPORTER: Would you raise 16 your right hands, please. 17 (Whereupon, the oath was 18 duly administered by the 19 Notary.) 20 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Okay, we'll note 21 that there were six witnesses sworn in, we'll 22 introduce them as -- I don't know if they're 23 all going to testify or answer questions, but 24 --</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 9</p> <p>1 MR. WHITE: If appropriate, I'll 2 introduce those. 3 Good evening, Mr. Chairman 4 and members of the Board, my name is James 5 White, I am an attorney, I office at 160 South 6 Municipal Drive in Sugar Grove, Illinois. I 7 represent Moksh Dham Cremation, Inc. It's an 8 Illinois not-for-profit company. I will be 9 making a proffer of testimony and confirming 10 accuracy with the witnesses who have been sworn 11 in. 12 I have presented the 13 exhibits. Moksh Dham is respectfully 14 requesting a conditional use to allow the 15 development of a funeral home with ancillary 16 cremation services on the property which is 17 commonly known as 5N047 Route 83 in 18 unincorporated DuPage County, Bensenville, 19 Illinois. Moksh Dham is the contract purchaser 20 of the property. 21 The property is 22 approximately four and-a-half acres, presently 23 zoned R-4 Single-Family Residence District in 24 the County of DuPage. Currently there is a</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 10</p> <p>1 dilapidated vacant split-level brick and frame 2 building on the property. It's bounded on the 3 north by park district property, a water park; 4 and on the east and south by school uses. On 5 the west is Illinois Route 83 and residential 6 both in the County and in Bensenville. 7 The R-4 Single-Family 8 Residence District allows as a conditional use 9 a funeral home. It states: [Reading] A 10 funeral home is a conditional use where the 11 subject property is located adjacent to a 12 non-residential zoning business district 13 boundary line, or the subject property has 14 frontage on at least a minor arterial roadway. 15 Furthermore, all vehicles related to the 16 operation of the funeral home shall be parked 17 or stored in a completely enclosed building. 18 The subject property 19 certainly has frontage on at least a minor 20 arterial street, specifically it's Illinois 21 Route 83 which is a four-lane major arterial 22 roadway. 23 The funeral home would not 24 be operating its own vehicles, and therefore</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 12</p> <p>1 those inherently associated with a funeral 2 home, irrespective of its location in the R-4 3 Single-Family District in DuPage County. 4 So, in other words, you must 5 find that this particular funeral home in this 6 particular location must have unique and 7 unusual adverse impacts not found with any 8 other funeral homes within the County. 9 As shown by the proposed 10 site plan, the funeral home would only have 11 access from Route 83, a major arterial street. 12 The vast majority of funeral services would be 13 during off-peak traffic hours and school hours, 14 such as nights and weekends. Likewise, the 15 vast majority of funeral services would end 16 with the cremation of the body eliminating 17 traffic impacts caused by funeral processions 18 to churches or cemeteries. Thus, there are 19 actually fewer traffic impacts relating to the 20 subject property than other funeral homes would 21 have within any other residential district. 22 The subject property has 23 wetlands on the north and east sides which will 24 be rehabilitated and enhanced creating an even</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 11</p> <p>1 having an enclosed building for parking and 2 storage is not necessary. 3 The Illinois Supreme Court 4 says that if a use is designated as a 5 conditional use in a Zoning District, that is a 6 legislative determination that such use is in 7 harmony with the general zoning plan and will 8 not adversely affect the neighborhood. The 9 case for that is City of Chicago Heights versus 10 Living Word Outreach Full Gospel Church & 11 Ministries, otherwise known as the Living Word 12 case. 13 Living Word case states that 14 an application for a conditional use permit may 15 not be denied on the grounds that the use is 16 not in harmony with the surrounding 17 neighborhood. It goes on to say that the 18 appropriate standard is whether the use would 19 have an adverse effect, and therefore should be 20 denied only where there are facts and 21 circumstances that show that the particular use 22 proposed here, a funeral home, at the 23 particular location proposed here on Route 83 24 would have any adverse effects above and beyond</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13</p> <p>1 greater buffer area to the north, east and 2 south. 3 There's no access to the 4 property from the recreation area on the north 5 or the educational uses on the south and east. 6 They would have to go through wetlands, and 7 they can't. 8 As proposed there are no 9 unique or unusual impacts to the surrounding 10 properties as there are no points of access to 11 them from the subject property. 12 The development of the 13 subject property as proposed would also cure a 14 long-standing violation with the DuPage County 15 Stormwater people that currently exists on the 16 subject property from the current owner. 17 I'm now going to go through 18 the elements of the conditional use, and the 19 first one being will it impair the adequate 20 supply of light and air to adjacent property? 21 The proposed funeral home will be developed in 22 compliance with the bulk regulations of the R-4 23 Single-Family Residence District relative to 24 setbacks, heights, open space and stormwater</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 14</p> <p>1 detention.</p> <p>2 The cremation process itself</p> <p>3 results in no smoke, no smell, and no noise.</p> <p>4 Section 37-1005.3 of the DuPage County Zoning</p> <p>5 Ordinance regarding particulate matter</p> <p>6 emissions would allow up to four and-a-half</p> <p>7 pounds of particulate matter emissions per hour</p> <p>8 from this property. Cremation furnaces that</p> <p>9 are proposed have particulate matters of only</p> <p>10 three-hundredths of a pound per hour. So</p> <p>11 that's significantly less than allowed by</p> <p>12 Ordinance or state law. The proposed funeral</p> <p>13 home will have no adverse impact on the</p> <p>14 adequate supply of light and air.</p> <p>15 The second standard is</p> <p>16 whether there would be an increase in hazard</p> <p>17 from fire or other dangers to the property.</p> <p>18 The proposed funeral home will comply with all</p> <p>19 DuPage codes relative to building, particulate</p> <p>20 matter, as well as the Fire Protection</p> <p>21 District. Inside and outside turning radii are</p> <p>22 shown on the site plan and conform to fire</p> <p>23 department standards. The fire lane is the</p> <p>24 appropriate distance from the building as</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 16</p> <p>1 added to the north, east and south of the</p> <p>2 property creating an even greater buffer than</p> <p>3 currently exists.</p> <p>4 The next standard is whether</p> <p>5 it would unduly increase traffic congestion on</p> <p>6 the public streets and highways. The property</p> <p>7 is located on the east side of Illinois Route</p> <p>8 83, a four-lane roadway. The proposed entrance</p> <p>9 to the subject property is across from Deer</p> <p>10 Path Road, which is up at the top. Then</p> <p>11 they'll use an existing curb cut which has an</p> <p>12 existing dedicated left-turn lane for</p> <p>13 southbound traffic. We would use the existing</p> <p>14 driveway entrance so there would be no change</p> <p>15 in that regard. The existing roadway</p> <p>16 configuration provides sufficient access to the</p> <p>17 subject property without unduly increasing</p> <p>18 traffic congestion on Route 83. As previously</p> <p>19 stated, the vast majority of funeral services</p> <p>20 would be during off-peak traffic hours, which</p> <p>21 is nights and weekends. Likewise, the vast</p> <p>22 majority of funeral services would end with the</p> <p>23 cremation of the body, eliminating traffic</p> <p>24 impacts caused by funeral processions to</p>

The building</p> <p>2 will have a sprinkler system, fire alarm</p> <p>3 system, and enhanced well to allow for greater</p> <p>4 fire flow. The redevelopment of the property</p> <p>5 will result in a newer building in compliance</p> <p>6 with current fire codes, thereby decreasing the</p> <p>7 hazard from fire or other dangers that</p> <p>8 currently exists on the property.</p> <p>9 The third standard is</p> <p>10 whether it will diminish the value of land and</p> <p>11 buildings in the vicinity of the proposed</p> <p>12 conditional use. The value of the school</p> <p>13 district and park district property is</p> <p>14 certainly dependent upon the quality of the</p> <p>15 education and the programs that they provide.</p> <p>16 The proposed funeral home will replace an older</p> <p>17 vacant building with an entirely new</p> <p>18 architecturally beautiful building. The</p> <p>19 proposed building will have no unusual adverse</p> <p>20 impact on the value of surrounding</p> <p>21 recreational, educational and residential uses,</p> <p>22 as well as aesthetically pleasing.</p> <p>23 As part of the wetlands</p> <p>24 rehabilitation, addition landscaping will be</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 17</p> <p>1 churches or cemeteries; thus, there are</p> <p>2 actually fewer traffic impacts related to the</p> <p>3 subject property as stated.</p> <p>4 The next standard is whether</p> <p>5 it will increase the potential for flood</p> <p>6 damages to adjacent property. The subject</p> <p>7 property will comply with the DuPage County</p> <p>8 Code relative to stormwater and will correct an</p> <p>9 existing stormwater violation as I stated.</p> <p>10 The next standard is whether</p> <p>11 it will incur additional public expense for</p> <p>12 fire protection, rescue or relief. The</p> <p>13 proposed funeral home will comply with all</p> <p>14 DuPage County Codes relative to building</p> <p>15 particulates, as well as the Fire Protection</p> <p>16 District. There is nothing unique about the</p> <p>17 property that would cause the Fire Protection</p> <p>18 District to need to acquire additional</p> <p>19 equipment. The building will have a sprinkler</p> <p>20 system and a fire alarm system. Again, there</p> <p>21 will be an enhanced well to help with fire</p> <p>22 suppression. All improvements would be</p> <p>23 privately owned and any fire protection, rescue</p> <p>24 or relief would not entail any additional</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 18</p> <p>1 public expense. 2 The final standard is 3 whether it would otherwise impair the public 4 health, safety, comfort, morals or general 5 welfare of the inhabitants of DuPage County, 6 nor will it create a nuisance. The proposed 7 conditional use will generally be consistent 8 with similar funeral homes within DuPage County 9 and with all ordinances relative to public 10 health, safety, comfort, morals and general 11 welfare of the inhabitants of DuPage County. 12 Under Illinois law as set forth in the Living 13 Word case, DuPage County has already 14 legislatively determined that a funeral home in 15 the R-4 Residential District is in harmony with 16 the general zoning plan of DuPage County and 17 will not adversely affect the neighborhood. So 18 I submit to you that there are no facts or 19 circumstances which exist to support a 20 conclusion that this funeral home in this 21 location adversely impacts the surrounding 22 neighborhood. 23 But there is many positive 24 impacts. Although the funeral home is funded</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 20</p> <p>1 Dr. Patel, could you step 2 up? Dr. Patel, did I accurately state the 3 facts as you know them to be? 4 DR. PATEL: Yes, that's correct. 5 MR. WHITE: Is there anything you would 6 add? 7 DR. PATEL: You covered everything. 8 THE COURT REPORTER: Excuse me, can you 9 speak into the microphone. 10 MR. WHITE: Is there anything you would 11 like to add? 12 DR. PATEL: No. He has explained 13 everything in detail and this is the right 14 situation where it should go. 15 MR. WHITE: Mr. Verani [phonetic]? 16 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: As you introduce the 17 witnesses, would you tell us what their 18 particular expertise is or what their function 19 is? 20 MR. WHITE: Yes. So Dr. Patel is going 21 to be the head of the Moksh Dham operation 22 itself. 23 Mr. Verani is the design 24 consultant and architect.</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 19</p> <p>1 by the Hindi community, it's a not-for-profit. 2 Moksh Dham would not discriminate, but would be 3 open to all with full dignity for the dearly 4 departed. 5 There would be no smell, no 6 smoke, and no noise from the cremation process. 7 There would be no real 8 impact on traffic due to the normal timing of 9 services during non-peak traffic hours and very 10 few funeral processions to impact traffic. 11 There's no access to the 12 property through adjoining properties because 13 wetlands traverse the property. 14 Tree coverage from the 15 north, east and south create natural buffers 16 which will be enhanced by the wetland 17 rehabilitation. And the current dilapidated 18 condition of the property will be transformed 19 into a first class funeral home with all the 20 laws and ordinances. 21 Practically and legally 22 speaking, the location complies with the DuPage 23 County Zoning Ordinance for the approval of a 24 conditional use and should be approved.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 21</p> <p>1 Mr. Verani, did I accurately 2 state the facts as you know them to be? 3 MR. VERANI: Quite true, quite true 4 absolutely. And I am happy that the 5 presentation was right down to the mark because 6 every issue that we tried to tackle in this 7 situation has been explained clearly. Thank 8 you. 9 MR. WHITE: Mr. Anderson with 10 Christopher Burke Engineering with regard to 11 wetland mitigation. 12 Mr. Anderson, did I 13 accurately state the facts as you know them to 14 be? 15 MR. ANDERSON: Yes, sir. 16 MR. WHITE: Is there anything you would 17 like to add? 18 MR. ANDERSON: Not at this time. 19 MR. WHITE: Thank you. 20 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Can I interrupt just 21 to ask if the mitigation is going to occur 22 on-site or off-site, wetland mitigation? 23 MR. ANDERSON: So we're going to enhance 24 the existing wetlands so that's roughly a half</p>

They were damaged by the previous 2 landowner so we're going to restore them to 3 their -- we're actually going to make them to a 4 higher level of floristic quality than they 5 were originally. There will be additional 6 native plantings in the buffer areas. If 7 you've gone by the site recently you'll know 8 it's been mowed over the last ten years or so 9 in the buffer area. The buffer area will be 10 restored back to native prairie, so a lot of 11 pollinator species, things like that. There 12 will be additional native plantings added 13 elsewhere on the perimeter of the site and to 14 the northeast corner of the property which is 15 also mowed by the neighbors, and that will be 16 converted to native plantings as well. 17 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Thank you. 18 MR. WHITE: Michael Mondus, civil 19 engineer from Spaceco. 20 Mr. Mondus, did I accurately 21 state the facts as you know them to be? 22 MR. MONDUS: You did. 23 MR. WHITE: Is there anything else you 24 would like to add?</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 24</p> <p>1 accurately state the facts as you know them to 2 be? 3 MR. PARDUHN: Yes, sir. 4 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Anything that you 5 would like to add? 6 MR. PARDUHN: Not at this time. I'm 7 happy to answer any questions you guys might 8 have about the equipment as well. 9 MR. WHITE: With that, thank you Mr. 10 Chairman and members of the Board. 11 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Okay. How do you 12 determine -- well, has your organization 13 operated funeral homes previously? 14 MR. WHITE: Dr. Patel? 15 DR. PATEL: No. 16 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: How do you make the 17 determination that there will be minimal impact 18 on traffic because the great majority of 19 funerals will include a cremation rather than a 20 funeral procession to a graveyard? How do you 21 make that determination? 22 DR. PATEL: First of all, the traffic 23 not going to be affected. Secondly, too, 24 because the funeral will be on Saturday and</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 23</p> <p>1 MR. MONDUS: Not at this time. 2 MR. WHITE: Mr. Frank Nemes from 3 Christopher B. Burke Engineering, the traffic 4 consultant. 5 Mr. Nemes, did I accurately 6 state the facts as you know them to be? 7 MR. NEMES: I would only add one minor 8 thing. Illinois 83 is six lanes, three lanes 9 in each direction. 10 MR. WHITE: Thank you. 11 MR. NEMES: Otherwise all the facts 12 listed were correct. 13 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Was there a written 14 traffic study report? 15 MR. NEMES: No. 16 MR. WHITE: When we spoke with -- and 17 you can confirm this, when we spoke with -- 18 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: I just wanted to 19 know if there was one, I'm not asking for one. 20 MR. WHITE: Thank you. 21 And then Mr. Jakob Parduhn, 22 he's with Cremation Systems, the equipment 23 supplier. 24 Mr. Parduhn, did I</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 25</p> <p>1 Sunday. Most of the funeral cremation will be 2 on Saturday and Sunday, that's one thing. That 3 going to be in off-hours so there is no other 4 traffic, which is like 9:00 to 1:00 and 4:00 to 5 7:00 which are the busy hours. Most of the 6 cremations will be during off-hours, non-peak 7 hours. Hardly there may be one or two funerals 8 maybe during the day, weekdays, and that 9 probably generally take place between 11:00 and 10 4:00, so that also will not be during the peak 11 hours. 12 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: On what basis do you 13 make these conclusions? 14 DR. PATEL: Because here there are so 15 many funeral home and we go in my community, I 16 attend the funerals, and this is what I have 17 seen all, like, last 55 years. 18 CHAIRMAN KARTHOLL: Okay. And I don't 19 think you answered the percentage or number of 20 funerals that result in cremations rather than 21 burials. 22 DR. PATEL: As far as my community is 23 concerned, it is 100 percent. But, nowadays 24 the cremation has gone up. It has -- it was in</p>
