Subject: Support Jail Workers!

In consideration of the 2026 proposed budget, the sheriff's medical and

mental health unit continue to ask for your support. We remain unable to

attract and retain employees based on pay and benefits. Our turnover rate

over the past several years has remained at approximately 70%.

Several factors influence retention in our department. The acuity in the jail is increasing exponentially. The drug epidemic alone has been an insurmountable challenge now that heroin, cocaine, Xanax, etc. are cut with synthetic substances. The physical, emotional, and cognitive impairments that we are seeing have far surpassed anything we have witnessed in the past. In addition, a substance available at any vape store, often referred to as gas station heroin, has proven to be highly dangerous, especially during withdrawal. Head banging, psychosis, self-directed violence are becoming more common.

We are also seeing patients with chronic diseases remaining in custody more so than ever since the SAFE-T Act, such as those requiring cardiac monitoring, trachs, wound care, and daily dressing changes. Yet, our medical staffing levels have remained the same. When new hires see the low staffing levels and high acuity which increases risk to their license, they quickly move on to hospitals and clinics that offer more attractive pay and incentives. Since COVID, nurses remain in high demand and are highly compensated in other corrections agencies such as Cook County and IDOC, and in hospitals, and clinics.

Similarly, Mental Health clinicians are in high demand since COVID when telepsych behavioral health services were deemed reimbursable by insurance companies. As a result, we have seen many clinicians moving into private practice.

With a retention rate of 30% over several years now, patient care is greatly compromised, which leaves the organization at a continued high risk for litigation. Although the sheriff's office is accredited by NCCHC and ACA, our compliance required corrective action for the past two audits; and unless an auditor refuses hand-picked charts provided by management to review, it remains undetected that the department is not following the standards required by the accrediting body.


Because of the high turnover, the nursing schedule continues to be pieced together day to day, at times leaving one or two nurses on shift for nearly 600 inmates. Further, when there are not adequate mental health staff to monitor mentally ill patients at high risk for serious decompensation, it becomes a recipe for disaster.

In contrast to the medical/mental health department, compensation for deputy staff within the sheriff's department has been competitive for quite some time now which has resulted in high retention. Recently, deputy staff also received a significant market adjustment as a recruitment and retention effort to attract talent in the current climate facing law enforcement professionals. As a female-dominated department in a male-dominated arena, we feel that we have not been given the same opportunities to succeed. In fact, master's level mental health clinicians with years of experience, and nurses with decades of experience, currently earn nearly \$15-25k less than a new deputy straight out of the academy. Further, male psychologists earned

more in 2016 than a female psychologist with several years of experience nearly 10 years later.

The medical department offers equal value and worth but has been undercompensated, undervalued, leaving us feeling completely dismissed as professionals. Even with proposed increases during negotiations, we remain below market value and are told that no comparable salaries exist. Other correctional institutions have increased pay and benefits to ensure coverage based on the litigious nature of corrections. Some agencies that have outsourced are now returning to direct government employment, as third party contractors are using staffing agencies to provide bodies for coverage, often compromising the quality of the candidate hired. The greatest protection from litigation is to be able to control the quality of employees by hiring directly and to offer attractive pay and benefits that will result in a highly qualified and dedicated workforce here at DuPage County.

Our professionals strive to provide the best medical and MH services but are unable to do so with the limited resources our department has experienced over the past several years. We thank you in advance for your support.

While I applaud the efforts of the Chair to include first time homebuyer


incentives as part of the proposed budget, the most immediate problem in the

sharing between agencies are not clearly defined.


